Carey Baptist College has been established by Carey Community Baptist Church with the vision to set a standard of educational excellence in Australia as an institution whose ethos and practice is based upon Christian precepts.

Carey Baptist College is a Centre of Learning focused on effective teaching and student learning. Meaningful relationships are formed in an atmosphere of academic rigour and enthusiasm for excellence.

The College has been established as an educational institution dedicated to the academic and social well-being of all students. General Information

Contact with Home

In an effort to keep lines of communication open, the following methods will be employed:

- Staff will try to speak with you at the beginning or end of each day; however, if you have concerns about your child's well-being or progress that you wish to discuss, please make an appointment. We appreciate information about your child's needs, health or situations at home that may impact their learning.
- Our class parent representatives will regularly correspond with parents via email. These communications will consist of reminders for special events, minutes from PIP meetings and invitations to social occasions. For privacy reasons, all group emails will be sent privately.
- You can view our fortnightly school newsletter through the Carey website and it will be emailed to all parents.
- If you are unable to drop off or pick up your child regularly, email contact is encouraged. Your teacher will give you their email address at the beginning of the year.

Collection of Children

Please make every effort to be punctual. Children can become distressed when their parents or caregivers are late to collect them.

Please note that children will be escorted to the Primary Office if a parent or caregiver is late, and the teacher has duties after school that require them to leave the classroom.

Child Collection Arrangements

Your child will NOT be allowed to leave with an adult or sibling other than the parent or carer nominated at the beginning of the year, unless parents have notified the College in writing. A Student Release Form will be given to all families at the beginning of the year for you to list all the authorised people who may collect your child. We have this policy in place to protect you and your child and feel that any inconvenience caused is worthwhile to ensure your child's safety.

Custody Arrangements

It is the responsibility of families with child custody arrangements to make the Principal and Assistant Principal - Pastoral Care aware of the necessary details and to provide the relevant documentation so that it may be placed on the student's file.

Sickness/Accidents and Emergencies

Should a child become ill or involved in an accident, parents will be contacted immediately. Please ensure that the College has a current emergency number that you or your emergency contact can be contacted on at all times.

Toys

Unless children are requested to bring a specific toy for a learning activity, please leave all toys at home. They can cause negative peer pressure and inappropriate play. No responsibility can be taken for lost or broken toys.

Carey is a war-toy free zone and violent role-play games are discouraged.

Birthdays

We enjoy making children feel special as they celebrate their birthdays. You are most welcome to send a cake to share on your child's birthday. The most manageable method is to send a cupcake or treat for each child. We ask parents of children with allergies to provide a safe treat food that can be given to them at celebration times.

The Early Learning Centre is a nut-free zone.

Houses

KENNEDY (Orange): Reverend William Kennedy was a missionary in the country areas of Victoria, before accepting the call to pastor a church in Katanning. He then established a number of Baptist churches throughout the south-west of Western Australia and was well known for the care, compassion and assistance he gave to families in isolated farming communities.

FLYNN (Black): Reverend John Flynn established the Flying Doctor medical service, originally known as the Australian Inland Mission, bringing medical services to people in outback Australia.

WILLIAMS (White): Sister Ella Williams spent many years serving the sick and homeless in Western Australia. Upon retiring she travelled to India to work with Mother Theresa helping the poor and marginalised in the slums of Calcutta.

COURT (Teal): Margaret Court, Australia's greatest female tennis player, who is now Pastor of Victory Life Centre. This is a large community church in the city of Perth which offers support, encouragement and help to people in crisis.

Kindergarten Staggered Start - Term 1

Starting a new job or adventure can often be a daunting prospect. Starting Kindergarten is no exception, as for many children this can be their first time away from Mum and Dad. To foster a gentle, relaxed and reassuring atmosphere we have provided your child with a gradual transition to full-time Kindergarten attendance.

The Kindergarten will be opened each morning at 8:30am for community time. This is an opportunity for parents to look at their child's work and photos around the classroom. It also enables parents and Kindergarten staff to communicate information relevant to that day (e.g. your child will be picked up during the day for an appointment). Teachers use the time before the Kindergarten opens for preparation of learning experiences and materials.

Weeks 1 and 2: *(Further details will be forwarded)*

Children will attend on their designated days, either 8:45am-11:00am or 12:45pm-3:00pm. Parents may stay with their child during the first week.

NOTE: Week 1 is an odd week, so Wednesday Kindy takes place for K1 and K3.

Weeks 3 and 4:

From the third week until the end of the fourth week your child will attend two or three half days from 8:30am until 1:00pm on their designated days. This includes lunch.

Week 5 to 10:

From the fifth week of Term 1 your child will start attending full days ie. from 8:30am-3:10pm on their designated days.

Terms 2, 3 and 4:

Children attend from 8:30am-3:10pm on their designated days.

Kindergarten & Pre-Primary Information

What to Bring?

It would be appreciated if parents could bring consumables and Book List items in to Kindy and Pre-Primary on your child's first day. These do not need to be labelled with your child's name as they are class sets.

On subsequent days please bring:

- A small named container for fruit or vegetables to eat at recess time. (Kindy students - bring a whole fruit or vegetable to be cut up & shared. Pre-Primary students bring their own container of fruit or vegetables).
- A labelled Carey hat for outdoor time.
- A labelled spare set of underpants and clothing including socks to be kept in school bag. Please remember to check these for seasonal suitability and for your child's growth throughout the year. Spare clothes do not need to be uniform.
- A labelled drink bottle with water in it. No cordial or juice please.

Ways Parents Can Help - Settling In

We want your child to settle into Kindy and Pre-Primary happily. Come in and sit on the mat with your child and do a puzzle or look at a book with them. When it is time to go, please leave promptly with a confident 'goodbye'. Your confidence in your child's ability to cope is important. Most children settle quickly once their parents go, but be assured, if there are problems we will let you know. After Week 5, you may like to put your name on our Parent Help Roster.

Parents Roster

Parents are invaluable to the Kindergarten and Pre-Primary programme. With your support, we are able to provide a greater variety of learning experiences/activities. Parents are welcome to volunteer whenever possible.

A parent helper assists the staff with children's activities, cleaning up activities and generally joining in the fun. Being on roster provides an excellent opportunity for seeing your child interacting with others as well as giving you a chance to participate in their learning. If you are unable to take part in the Parent Roster; grandparents, aunts, uncles or close family friends are welcome to come in your place. Children enjoy having family members visit them in class. It is an important transition from home to school. A roster will be displayed on the noticeboard each term. **Parents will need to sign in at the Primary Office before proceeding to the classroom.**

Kindergarten & Pre-Primary Information cont...

Laundry Roster

Each week we have aprons and towels to be laundered, so throughout the year you will be asked to take one or two turns at washing them. Each week a name will be selected from a box. The lucky family gets to be our laundry helper that week. The children love this and we hope you do too! It would be appreciated if you could return the washing the following Monday or Tuesday.

Developing Independence

It is our aim to encourage the children toward independence whilst fostering inter-dependence on others. To assist in this process please allow them to take responsibility for putting their fruit in the bowl, putting bag away etc. **We do expect the children to be able to use the toilet themselves.**

Using Your Skills and Talents

We are very interested in benefiting from your skills and interests. For example: Do you love sewing, building things, cutting or pasting? Can you explain in simple terms how a light switch works or set up a pulley system? Do you have access to resources that would enhance the learning programme or Kindergarten environment? Do you know people we could meet or places we could visit? If so, please let us know!

Health and Safety

It is common for Primary children to contract minor ailments particularly if they have spent limited time in a group setting. Although it may be inconvenient, please do not send children to school if they are sick. Remember the impact on other families! If your child is ill, or absent, a signed note should be given to the teacher or Absentees notified by email when your child returns.

Children should not attend school:

- Within 24 hours of commencing antibiotics
- Until at least 24 hours after the cessation of diarrhoea (the exclusion period automatically increases to 36 hours for children who have had diarrhoea, if there have been 3 or more cases in a class)
- Until at least 48 hours after their last episode of vomiting (the exclusion period automatically increases to 36 hours for all children who have vomited, if there have been 3 or more cases in a class).
- If they have had a temperature of 37.5C or more in the past 24 hours

Parents will be asked to collect their child from school as soon as possible if they have a temperature of 38C; if they vomit; have evidence of loose bowels; or eye discharge that returns after being cleared.

Kindergarten & Pre-Primary Information cont...

Parents are asked to keep their child at home if they have nasal discharge or cough, with associated symptoms of illness.

The following illnesses require exclusion from school: Chicken Pox, Head Lice, Cold Sores, Vomiting, Diarrhoea, Influenza, School Sores, Impetigo, Scarlet Fever, Ringworm, Measles, Mumps, Hand Foot and Mouth Disease.

Prior to starting school:

As per your Enrolment Form, we have noted if your child has any allergies or medication needs.

If your child requires an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) the Primary Office must receive this for your child before the school year begins. You can collect this form from your child's doctor or from the Primary Office.

Change of Medical Information:

Notifying the College of any changes to your child's medical information is essential in enabling the College to fulfil its Duty of Care to your child in the event of an accident, illness or emergency. **Please ensure that your medical information and contact details with the school are correct at all times.**

In the event that your child's medical information, address, phone number, email or emergency contacts change, **please update your details via our website immediately.**

Communications

Absences

The School Education Act 1999 requires compulsory aged students , as defined in the Act, to attend school, or participate in an educational program of a school, on the days on which the school is open for instruction unless an arrangement in writing has been entered into for a student.

Although there is no legal requirement in the School Education Act 1999 for pre- and post-compulsory aged students to enrol in a school, there is an expectation that once enrolled, students will attend on a regular basis and positive attendance patterns should be fostered with all students by schools.

Students who need to attend appointments, or who will be absent during class times, should notify the class teacher via email or a written note prior to the event. When unexpected absences occur, or sickness necessitates being away from the College, an SMS or email should be submitted to the Absentee Officer as soon as possible. A Medical Certificate may be required to explain prolonged absences.

When a parent or caregiver is required to collect a student from the College during school hours, and upon their return, please report to the Primary Administration Office. **You will be required to tag your child in or out via our SEOTA system indicating that the child has been removed from and/or returned to the school premises.**

PLEASE NOTE: In the case of an expected prolonged absence the Teacher or Assistant Principal - Pastoral Care, in addition to the Absentee Officer, should be notified in writing or an appointment made to discuss the absence.

Notification Procedure:

SMS Messages are sent to families by 10:30am if a child is marked absent. The absence is resolved immediately if the parent responds. Please reply to the SMS or email the Absentee Officer on absentees@carey.wa.edu.au as soon as possible.

Communicating with Parents

Establishing strong lines of communication is important in developing strong links between the home and school.

Please be aware that at the commencement of the school day teachers are busy preparing for class and welcoming and settling children into their routines. Emails

Parents may contact teachers directly through email. Please remember ; teachers cannot read emails while they are working with children. Before school is also a very busy time and staff may not be able to read your message before the start of the day.

Please be aware that the turnaround time for a response to emails is 24 hours at the minimum.

Parents in Partnership

Parent Involvement

At Carey we recognise that parents play the most significant part in their child's journey to life-long learning. The values and attitudes that parents hold towards school will strongly influence the values and attitudes that their children hold. This in turn will impact on each child's learning. To this end, we encourage and welcome parent involvement. There are many ways that you can be involved in your child's schooling, for example:

- Rostered help in the classroom, Art Room or Library
- Assisting with Literacy Support
- Assisting with special events and sports carnivals
- Excursions and Camps
- Busy Bees, special projects
- Kiss and Ride - Drop off and Pick up assistance

Please see your child's classroom teacher if you are available to assist in any of these areas.

If you have any special skills that you may be able to share with students or if you have access to resources that would enhance our learning programs we would love to hear from you.

In addition, parents are welcome to become involved in the 'Parents in Partnership' (PIP) at the College. A volunteer parent representative from each class acts as a liaison between parents, PIP and the College, ensuring that relevant information and requests are communicated to parents in each class.

Meetings are held each term and provide a forum for parents to ask questions, express concerns and meet other parents in a friendly and positive atmosphere. You are most welcome to attend. Please check our Primary Calendar on our website for next 'PIP' meeting time.

Community Health Nurse

Community Health Nurses (Schools) from Armadale Community Health Service provide services to the school. The nurses visit the school by arrangement to:

- Provide assistance with, and monitoring of, children with chronic medical conditions
- Undertake assessments of children, with parental consent, to detect and refer on, when required, conditions adversely affecting learning
- Participate in and provide assistance to health promotion and health education programs
- Provide health-related short-term counselling and crisis intervention on health-related issues
- Advocate for health-related issues when required
- Vision and hearing checks (Kindy)

The nurses can be consulted by parents/caregivers to discuss any health-related issue affecting their children by contacting them via the Primary Administration Office.

Speech Therapy

'Flat Chat' is a part-time speech pathology service at the College. It is a private service and parents are responsible for booking therapy sessions and paying the pathologist directly.

This is for Carey students only, and parents are required to attend the therapy sessions with their child. Information is available through the Primary Administration Office.

Uniform

Policy

Wearing a uniform is not meant to establish uniformity or deny individuality, but to encourage students to identify with their College and develop a sense of belonging. It is our hope that our students will wear their uniform with a sense of pride and accomplishment as they identify with Carey - a place of growth and learning that will play a significant role in their lives both now and in the future.

To this end, we encourage students to become self-disciplined in wearing their uniform appropriately and to be aware that the integrity of their College is reflected to the wider community through their behaviour and appearance. The College uniform has been carefully and creatively designed to be a uniform that students are proud to wear.

We have endeavoured to be flexible in determining the most appropriate way for students to wear the uniform, taking into consideration the age of students and the type of play they engage in, but without compromising our standard of and commitment to excellence in all areas.

With younger children, parents play an important role in encouraging that the correct uniform is worn to school. As children grow, becoming more independent, it is of course desirable that they learn to take responsibility and ownership for correctly and appropriately wearing their uniform.

Management

Students are required to wear the College uniform as designated below. It is expected that children become familiar with the uniform and wear it appropriately.

If children are inappropriately dressed a note will be sent home to parents indicating the inconsistency.

If children are incorrectly dressed for a College function or excursion parents will be notified on the day and may be requested to bring the correct uniform to the College or the children may be excluded from involvement in the planned activity.

The Carey broad-brimmed black hat is to be worn outdoors at all times. The College policy of "No Hat, No Play" will be strictly adhered to.

Aprons are provided for messy activities; however, it is inevitable that clothing becomes dirty occasionally. Paint stains need to be soaked in cold water overnight before washing. Soaking in soda water may work as well.

On warm days, children may participate in water play activities. Please keep extra clothes packed in their bag just in case. Water play provides great opportunities to develop Maths and Science concepts.

Please label each item of clothing to avoid confusion.

Uniform (cont.)

Hair must be neatly tied up at all times if it is at collar length. Students are required to use plain black scrunchies or elastics to tie hair back (with no attachments). Black hair clips are to be used to keep hair out of the eyes. Decorative hair clips are not to be worn. Only hair headbands available from the College Uniform Shop are to be worn.

Please label each item of clothing to avoid confusion. Please apply sunscreen to your child/ren before coming to school.

Aprons are provided for messy activities; however, it is inevitable that clothing becomes dirty occasionally. Paint stains need to be soaked in cold water overnight before washing. Soaking in soda water may work as well.

On warm days, children may participate in water play activities. Please keep extra clothes packed in their bag just in case. Water play provides great opportunities to develop Maths and Science concepts.

Please check that your child's spare clothes still fit and suit the season. Please label each item of clothing to avoid confusion.

Hair must be neatly tied up at all times if it is at collar length. Students are required to use plain black scrunchies or elastics to tie hair back (with no attachments). Black hair clips are to be used to keep hair out of the eyes. Decorative hair clips are not to be worn. Only hair headbands available from the College Uniform Shop are to be worn.

Kindergarten Curriculum

How do children learn at Kindergarten?

The Kindergarten programme is guided by the principles and outcomes of the Early Years Learning Framework. We employ a thematic approach, covering all developmental learning areas (Spiritual, Physical, Emotional, Social, Personal, Creative, Cognitive and Linguistic). An integrated programme that uses play, discovery and hands-on experience makes learning more meaningful to young children. The children participate in whole-class 'mat sessions' and small-group structured activities designed to develop specific skills or concepts.

A great deal of valuable learning also occurs in the 'learning centres' of the classroom, eg: the book corner, dramatic play corner, block corner, puzzles and manipulative area, writing centre, easel painting, collage and play dough tables, listening post and iPads. Play is very important for success in literacy and numeracy development.

Outdoor Play

Outdoor play provides an opportunity for children to develop their physical skills, promote being physically active and use their imagination and problem-solving skills in different environments. Obstacle courses are planned and arranged to develop fundamental movement skills (eg: balancing, climbing, jumping, throwing and catching). With an emphasis on participation, all children are encouraged to be involved in a wide range of physical activities. **Sunscreen is available in Terms 1 and 4. Please apply sunscreen to your child on entry to the class.**

Primary Garden

The Primary Garden is integral to the Kindy and Pre-Primary Science program. It provides a valuable outdoor classroom area where the children participate in hands-on learning experiences.

Information Technologies

It is our aim to assist students to develop the skills that will enable them to use information technology across the curriculum. Students are able to access different technologies in the classroom.

Pre-Primary Curriculum

The Pre-Primary programme is based upon the Western Australian Curriculum, as outlined by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA), who is responsible for assessment, standards and reporting for all Western Australian Schools. It is also guided by the principles and outcomes of the Early Years Learning Framework.

In Pre-Primary, students learn through intentional teaching, interaction with others, investigation, experimentation and play.

Priority is given to literacy and numeracy development, as these are the foundation upon which further learning is built. Opportunities to develop literacy and numeracy are integrated across all subjects.

English:

In Pre-Primary, students view, listen to and enjoy texts such as stories, rhymes and books that entertain and inform. They start to learn to read and write.

Typically, students will:

- Communicate with peers and adults in familiar situations
- Recognise rhyming words and syllables
- Recognise letters and the most common sounds the letters make
- Develop skills in 'sounding out' words to read and write
- Read some personally significant words
- Read books with one or more sentences, pictures and familiar vocabulary
- Write some personally significant words
- Write simple recounts, messages and stories

Pre-Primary Curriculum cont...

Mathematics

In Pre-Primary, students develop a sense of number, order, sequence, pattern and position in relation to familiar settings.

Typically, students will:

- Connect numbers, their names and quantities up to 20
- Count numbers in sequence to 20 and beyond
- Model simple addition and equal sharing
- Copy and continue patterns
- Compare lengths, weights and volumes
- Sort objects and shapes
- Connect events with/to days of the week
- Develop an understanding of location words, such as above, outside, left etc

Health and Physical Education

Physical Education provides an opportunity for children to not only develop their physical skills but also to increase their confidence and sense of self worth. All children are encouraged to be involved in a wide range of sporting and physical activities, with an emphasis on participation.

Fundamental movement skills and game skills are covered in the program. Pre-Primary children will be involved in the Athletics Carnival.

Humanities and Social Sciences

By investigating and playing in familiar situations, students use their innate curiosity to make sense of the world, and develop knowledge and skills about people and places.

Typically, students will:

- Explore their personal world, including personal and family histories
- Investigate places they and their families live in and belong to
- Find out about other places
- Find out how people feel about places
- Explore why places are special
- Consider how people can care for places

Pre-Primary Curriculum cont...

Science

Students observe and explore to find answers to questions.

Typically, students will:

- Explore the needs of living things
- Investigate the properties of everyday materials
- Explore changes in our world; for example, weather and chemical reactions
- Explore how things move

The Primary Garden is integral to the Kindy and Pre-Primary Science program. It provides a valuable outdoor classroom area where the children participate in hands-on learning experiences.

The Arts

Students share their experiences and understanding of themselves via responding, creating and participating in musical, dramatic, media, dance and visual arts activities.

Technologies

Students learn how technologies work through exploration, design and problem solving. In Design Technologies, students typically:

- Design and create solution to challenges through guided play and using materials and equipment
- Represent data as pictures, symbols and diagrams, and sequence steps to solve simple problems

LOTE

Students have opportunity to learn two languages other than English.

Typically, students will:

- Imitate the sounds, rhythms and patterns of Indonesian/Japanese
- Use simple words and phrases, and non-verbal communication strategies in familiar situations
- Read and write simple words with visual support

Pre-Primary Curriculum (cont.)

Library

Pre-Primary children attend the library each week. Children are required to have a waterproof Carey library bag, available from the Uniform Shop. **Children are unable to borrow books without their library bag.**

Monitoring & Reporting on Children's Progress

Please show an interest in your child's work. It is very significant to them. Bear in mind, many learning experiences do not produce tangible end products. A lot of work is kept in the classroom in your child's file which includes checklists of specific skills and concepts, regular work samples and anecdotal records. Parent/teacher interviews are conducted late in Term 1.

You will receive a written report twice per annum and will have the opportunity to view your child's work throughout the year. You will also receive a thumb drive of photos recording highlights of your child's Pre-Primary experiences. In addition, you will receive class letters throughout the year.

Feedback will be given on your child's progress on request. If an area of concern is identified you will be contacted to discuss strategies to address it.

Pastoral Care & Behaviour Management

"The interaction between the teacher and the learner is at the heart of schooling. The quality of this relationship is the single most important factor in learning".

Staff at Carey are committed to building positive and meaningful relationships with students to optimise each child's learning potential. The College upholds five core values and these form the framework of a whole school approach to Pastoral Care which encompasses our code of behaviour management.

Appropriate behaviour is expected, taught and affirmed. Boundaries and expectations for behaviour are clearly defined and explained to students. Consistent consequences are enforced. Where appropriate, students are involved in determining boundaries and consequences, thereby encouraging them to take responsibility for their actions.

Emphasis is given to the prevention of problems before they arise, and to teaching students appropriate ways to behave, through specific social skills programmes. Students are encouraged to become self-monitoring in their behaviour.

Clearly defined boundaries are set and appropriate consequences consistently applied. Where boundaries are exceeded, students will be held accountable for their action. Teachers will assist students to understand why the behaviour is unacceptable, the impact of their behaviour on others and alternative ways to behave. Students will be supported by all members of staff in their efforts to change inappropriate behaviour.

Each member of the staff and student community has the right to feel comfortable and safe at school.

Students are therefore expected to be responsible and cooperative in their behaviour, reflecting self-respect and respect of others at all times.

Restorative Justice
